## Disputation of Doctor Martin Luther on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences



A monk in Wittenberg, Germany, nailed a document to the chapel door on October 31, 1517. It set forth 95 theses, or statements, intended for debate. Little did that monk, Martin Luther, know that the sound of his hammer would resound through the centuries and across the world. He challenged the religious order of his day and issued a call back to the Scriptures as the ultimate authority that guides all matters of faith. His bold action launched the Protestant Reformation. We remember that event as Reformation Day.

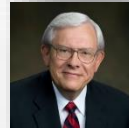
